- **Mark Daniel McLean, BA '67** (Spanish and French), passed away in Houston on Nov. 15, 2014. After receiving his MA at the University of North Carolina, Dan taught for many years at North Harris College in Houston. He also worked with several charitable organizations after getting his Master's in Social Work from the University of Houston. - **Judson (Jud) Lattimore Porter '53**, age 83, of Chicago, passed away Nov. 22, 2014. Married to Peggy Mesaros Porter '53 and a father of four, grandfather of six, and a great grandfather, Jud was a retired captain in the U.S. Air Force. He was a long-time active leader in the Chicago business community and was passionate about

his family and work -- and about the Chicago Cubs and Rotary. A member of both Delta Sig and Nose Brother, Jud was a man of unwavering integrity who would help anybody and could fix anything. - **Dr. Randy Lofgren (B.M.Ed. '62, M.M. '70, and Ed.D '74)**, age 74, of Waco, passed away Dec. 26, 2014. Randy retired from Baylor in May 2014 as associate vice president of constituent engagement and served as the BAA's executive director from 2001 to 2002. Randy met his wife, Jeanine, as a student at Baylor and upon graduation served as minister of music at Calvary Baptist Church and choral director at Waco High School before moving to Jefferson City, TN, in 1974. While there, he served as part of the music faculty at Carson Newman College and created and directed the touring music group, Something Special. Randy returned to Baylor in 1988 to serve in Baylor's Office of Development and spent the next 26 years here until his retirement. In addition to Jeanine, Randy is survived by his daughter Wendy and son Kevin, their spouses, and six grandchildren, and by his sister Karla and her family. - **Jack Loftis, '57**, age 80, of Houston, passed away Dec. 29, 2014. A native of Hillsboro in Central Texas, Jack worked for the Houston Chronicle for 40 years, serving as editor from 1987 until his retirement in 2002, when he was named editor emeritus. Jack guided the newspaper through 15 years of changing ownership and technology, and an increased investment in national and international reporting that included opening bureaus throughout Texas and Latin America. Jack also served as a director of the Baylor Alumni Association from 1998 to 2005. Jack played baseball as a Baylor freshman before becoming a sportswriter to pay for school, spent his early journalism career as a sportswriter, received the BAA's Distinguished Alumnus Award in 1988 and the Baylor Media Award in 1997, and saw the press box at the Baylor Ballpark renamed in his honor in 2001. - **Ralph Storm, '49**, passed away on Jan. 7, 2015. Ralph served Baylor as a trustee and Regent for 27 years and was known -- with his late wife, Jean -- for his dedicated years of service to and support of the University and its students. The Baylor Alumni Association presented Ralph with its Distinguished Alumnus Award in 1978, and the University awarded him the Herbert H. Reynolds Award for Meritorious Service to Students in 1985 and the Founders Medallion -- one of its most prestigious honors -- in 2007. In its [press release on Ralph's death](#), Baylor President and Chancellor Ken Starr said his life "reflected the heart and soul of Baylor University." Ralph made his mark in the oil and gas business and he and Jean were known as leaders at First Baptist Church in Corpus Christi. Ralph is survived by his two daughters, five grandchildren, six great-grandchildren, and nieces and nephews. - **Curtis W. Freeman**, who received his BA from Baylor, his M.Div from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, and his Ph.D from Baylor, has published [Contesting Catholicity: Theology for Other Baptists](#). Freeman is Research Professor of Theology and Director of the Baptist House of Studies at Duke Divinity School.
- **Does Football Success Imply Academic Quality?** Higher football achievement by a university leads administrators and professors at other schools to raise their estimates of the university's overall academic quality, says a study promoted recently by Harvard Business Review. Specifically, a 301-vote increase in the Associated Press's final football poll at the end of the season has the same effect on

Mona Rogers Burchette, '58, wife of former BAA Executive Vice President Ray Burchette '57, passed away peacefully on Jan. 20, 2015, at age 77. **A memorial service and reception will be held at 3 p.m. on Saturday, Jan. 31, at Highland Park Baptist Church in Austin, where Ray served as senior pastor for 25 years.** Mona is being remembered for her grace, wisdom, and sense of humor, for the recipes that she brought to church potluck dinners and served to friends and family, and for her love of Baylor. Mona was married for 57 years to Ray, who introduced a number of innovative programs and services that enriched the sense of tradition and community among the Baylor Family before he retired in 2000. That sense of community was important to Mona, who was [quoted in a 1998 Lariat article](#) bemoaning the loss of traditions like the slime cap and freshman paper and stressing the importance of class loyalty and rivalry. She is also survived by her son Matthew Rogers Burchette, a 1989 undergraduate and 1998 master's graduate of Baylor and his wife Julie. The Burchettes moved to Denver, CO, after Ray's retirement to be closer to Matt and his wife. James "JJ" Jordan, BBA '81, of Jefferson, Texas, died Dec. 21, 2014, at age 61. JJ ran track for Baylor in the 1970s running the 440 and Mile Relay, two events that his daughter Jennifer '99 (pictured with JJ above) would also run when she attended Baylor and achieved All-American status. One of the first minorities to run for Baylor, James "was an outstanding individual who anchored our 4x4 relay team and contributed a lot to our track team," said legendary Baylor coach Clyde Hart. "Jennifer inherited a lot of her father's competitiveness." JJ worked with the Texas Department of Public Safety for 38 years

where he served as Corporal for 16 years. He got the job shortly after graduation as a result of his prevention of a "snatch and grab" robbery at a Zale's jewelry store in the Richland Mall. "James took off after him and ran him down," Coach Hart said. "That thief made a really bad decision with James around." JJ is survived by his wife of 39 years, Jocelyn Jordan, and daughters Jennifer (Jordan) Washington BA '99, MSW '01; LaVatia Plummer, and LaKasha Smith.



Betty Ruth (Wansley) Hardin, '44, passed away peacefully on Nov. 27, 2014, in Kerrville, Texas at 91 years of age. Betty Ruth was born to Dr. Reuben and Matie (Byars) Wansley and raised in Cleburne, Texas, where her father practiced dentistry for 30 years. Betty married William 'Bill' Hardin in September 1944 while he was serving in the U.S. military. After her youngest child started school, Betty became a substitute teacher for several years in the Houston ISD. In 1972, she and Bill moved to Kerrville where they purchased the Smokehouse newsstand, bookstore, and tobacco shop and operated it for 20+ years. Betty was a member of the "redhead" club while a student at Baylor and routinely made visits to Homecoming and class reunions for many years to visit with old classmates. She was preceded in death by her husband and parents and is survived by her children and their spouses, by her grandchild, Jennifer (Hardin) Murillo '96, and many other grandchildren and great grandchildren.



David Hayse Goodrum, '71, a hard-working product of the West Texas oilfields, died unexpectedly Saturday, Dec. 20, 2014, at his home in Pecan Plantation, Granbury TX, at the age of 65. **A memorial service will be held at 2 p.m. on Saturday, February 7 at Pecan Baptist Church with a reception from 3-5 p.m. at Pecan Plantation Country Club.** A deft storyteller with an eye for the comical, David was known for tales that drew upon his early life in West Texas, his time at Baylor in the 1960s and '70s, and world travels with his wife of 21 years, Frieda. An active member of Kappa Omega Tau fraternity while at Baylor, David received his business degree and went to work for then-President Herbert Reynolds and as the bookstore accountant. After serving in the U.S. Navy, Joe returned to the oil business in Midland as a vice president of Joe Melton Drilling Company before

taking over the reins of Goodrum Oil & Gas Production Accounting in 1986 after his mother's retirement. He also became office manager for legendary Midland oilman Joe Parsley in 2000. After David and Freida retired in 2007, he enjoyed golfing, world travel, and Baylor sports, rehashing nearly all of the games with longtime friends Stephen Stuckert, David Fuller, Mike Connell, and Chris Evans. 

- **Sanders Letbetter, '56**, passed away on October 28, 2014, at the age of 81. Sanders, pictured above with his wife, Esther, was a resident of Bryan, TX, and a long-time member of Central Baptist Church in College Station, where he enjoyed singing in the choir, being in many Easter Pageants, serving in the Prayer Room, the Billy Graham Phone Center, and anything he was called to do. Although he was a

proud Bear, he was employed with Texas A&M for 25 years, with the last 11 years as the director of collegiate licensing. Sanders served in the U.S. Army and the Texas National Guard, and was known to be the first to always stand for the National Anthem at any event he attended. He was a long-time, proud member of the Kiwanis Club, serving as president in 1968 and recognized as the Kiwanian of the Year in 1986. - **The Honorable Larry W. Starr, J.D. '60**, was honored posthumously on Jan. 1, 2015, when his portrait was hung in the newly renovated Gregg County (TX) County Court at Law 1 where he served from 1981 to 1986. Judge Starr's judicial career included service as the second judge of the 188th Judicial District Court and was appointed by Governor George W. Bush to the Texarkana Court of Appeals. Judge Starr's widow, Nancy Ogletree Starr, BA '61, and his three children and their spouses have earned eight Baylor degrees, and his two oldest granddaughters will enroll this fall.
